## Some Elementary Data of the Manobo Language

From April 20th to May 26th 1968 I had the opportunity to visit the Manobo. They form a tribe which occupies a large area along the Agusan-river in Mindanao, Philippines. The first Manobo, south of Butuan, are found at Bitan-ágan, a small barrio about 12 km from Butuan. Bitan-ágan is situated at a small tributary, also called Bitan-ágan, of the great Agusan-river. Only a few Manobo have settled here, the rest of the area being occupied by Bisayan-

Farther to the south the Manobo are very numerous. They all speak locally slightly different dialects <sup>1</sup>.

Since I made this research mainly for comparative studies, the Manobodialect is presented by the same scheme as that used for the description of Minamanwa<sup>2</sup>. In this manner the differences and agreements of the dialects will be more obvious.

## A. Grammar

## I. Phonemes

There are three vowels:

- /a/: pronounced more or less like the a in the German word "kann". In unstressed syllables it may sometimes be pronounced like the o in the German word "konnte". This phoneme will be written a and o according to the pronunciation.
- /i/: pronounced more or less like the i in the English word "pin".
- /o/: pronounced more or less like the oo in the German word "Boot".
