

History [usimo] of the Mukema or Mphene of Talagwe. – The Mukema clan [lukolo] is among the clans [singholo] which came from far away into the land [isi] of Ukaguru [Ukagulu] <sup>3</sup>. The Mukema came from Irangi <sup>4</sup>. They had stayed there for many years along with other clans. Later that land of Irangi was entered by two other groups [ngholo] and those groups were fierce, the Masai [Wamasa] <sup>5</sup> and the Little-People [Fimbwiji].

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> Kaguru speak of the members of the Mukema matri-clan as Wamukema (sing. Mukema) from *kukema* "to bleat" referring to the sound of goats. They also sometimes speak of the clan by another name, Wamphene (sing. Mphene); *mphene* "goat". Kaguru speak of themselves as Wakagulu (sing. Mukagulu) and of their land as Ukagulu. They also sometimes refer to themselves as Wamegi (sing. Megi). I have throughout followed modern, conventional orthography for proper names, even when these differ from general usage by Kaguru.

<sup>4</sup> Most Kaguru believe that their ancestors came from the area now inhabited by the Rangi people of Kondoa-Irangi District, far to the north-west of Ukaguru.
