made of bamboo, while the *albid* have. This is evidently an error that has crept into the nomenclature of the arrows and has received citizenship. I thought at first that the error was mine, but repeated investigations have proved the correctness of my statement.

3. The gilá- (cf. fig. 14—20): the shaft is made of some kind of hard wood, ballási (lb. bannási; 11. bannaási), kurúnan, gulásin, katorí-, &c. The




Fig. 14-21. Gilá-Arrowhead. Fig. 22-23. Tubúyan-Arrowhead. Fig. 42. Amulet.

ballási is the Murraya exotica. L., one of the Rutaceae; but I was not able to identify any of the others satisfactorily. The head is made of iron, removable, and provided with two or more barbs (II. síma) cut from the solid; I have seen one specimen with 12 barbs. The point of the head at both sides and the upper side of the upper barbs, one on each side, have cutting wedge-shaped edges. The midrib between the wings or flat margins of the blade has generally a
