

made of bamboo, while the *albid* have. This is evidently an error that has crept into the nomenclature of the arrows and has received citizenship. I thought at first that the error was mine, but repeated investigations have proved the correctness of my statement.

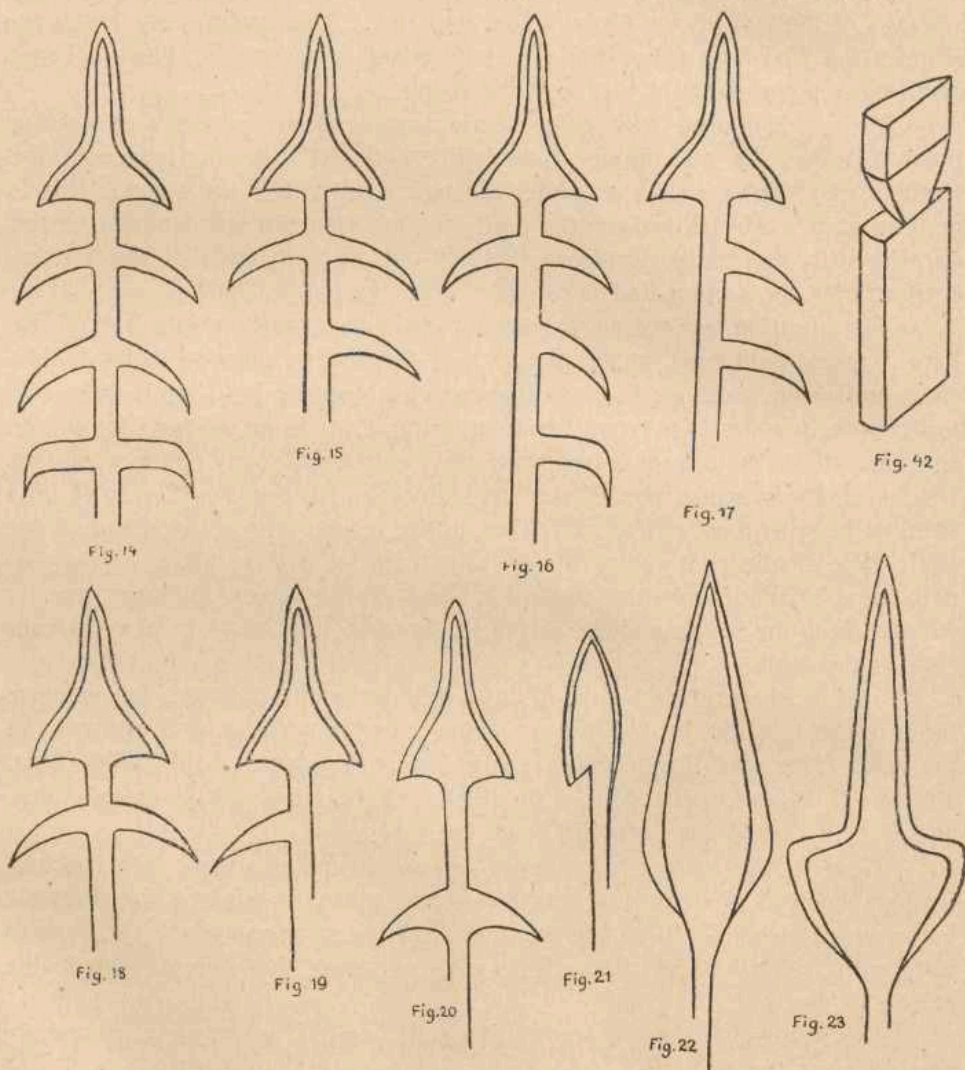


Fig. 14—21. *Gilá*-Arrowhead. Fig. 22—23. *Tubúyan*-Arrowhead. Fig. 42. Amulet.

3. The *gilá-* (cf. fig. 14—20): the shaft is made of some kind of hard wood, *ballási* (Ib. *bannási*; Il. *bannaási*), *kurúnan*, *gulásin*, *katorí-*, &c. The

*ballási* is the *Murraya exotica*, L., one of the Rutaceae; but I was not able to identify any of the others satisfactorily. The head is made of iron, removable, and provided with two or more barbs (Il. *síma*) cut from the solid; I have seen one specimen with 12 barbs. The point of the head at both sides and the upper side of the upper barbs, one on each side, have cutting wedge-shaped edges. The midrib between the wings or flat margins of the blade has generally a
